
In our case as we are at the moment seeking building companies to develop housing on this site, this application would have a serious detrimental effect in our ability to provide much needed housing on this site.

A LANGLEY councillor has called for urgent action to redevelop a former eyesore site before it becomes a magnet for flytippers.

Mayor Councillor Martin Prestidge said it had been Mayor Councillor Martin Prestidge said it had been almost a year since develict buildings at the Hughes-Johnson factory site in Mill Lane were knocked down.
"It's been nearly twelve months since the develict factory was demolished and so far no proposals have emerged for redevelopment of the site," he said.

"It's a massive brownfield site and I can see potential for really first class housing development on the site.
"I'm afraid that the site will become a magnet for fly tipping unless it is redeveloped."
